Well, let's look at the symbolism of the ash first of all. It is imposed on our heads to mark the first day of the solemn season of Lent - forty days of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. These ashes are a visible sign of our mortality - we are dust and to dust we shall return - but they should also make us reflect on our immortality, that through Jesus Christ we shall gain immortality, eternal life with God. When the ash is put on our forehead, it is placed in the form of a cross and this is a sign to us of God's unfailing love for us - the ash on our forehead indeed does say 'I love you'.

I suspect that those who sent a Valentine's card were hoping that there would be some sort of response, even though it may have been sent without a name. Most of us have known at some time in our lives the agony of a love which has no response from the other person. The three duties of Lent - prayer, fasting and almsgiving, should be our response to the love which God shows us - make these things the heart of your
